Each year Olivet College calculates the percentage of first time, full time, degree-seeking undergraduates (the “cohort”) who graduate with a bachelor’s degree within six calendar years of matriculation. This is commonly called the “150% graduation rate”. First time students are defined by IPEDS as those who have never earned college credits since their high school graduation, except for credits in the summer immediately following high school graduation. Only first time students who enroll full time in the Fall semester are included in the Fall Cohort. The final cohort is the total minus federally-allowed exclusions, such as those who leave for military service or foreign mission work.

Four-year average student right-to-know graduation rate: 46%

The Higher Education Act of 2008 requires disclosure of graduation rates broken down by gender, race/ ethnicity, and federal financial aid status. All graduation rates are based the “Final Cohort” who entered in the fall of the shown year as first time, full-time undergraduates .The “Final Cohort” can be reduced for students who die or suffer disability keeping them from going to college, go into federal service, enter the military, or go on overseas religious missions. The charts below are prepared in accord with that act, not reporting breakdowns that are statistically unreliable or where numbers are so small that they can reveal individual identities (*e.g.*, specific ethnic groups whose numbers are five or less). Underrepresented minorities include anyone who was Black/African-American, American Indian/Alaska Native, Native Hawaiian/Other Pacific Islander and/or Hispanic/Latino/a.
