A strong foundation in liberal arts includes a general education curriculum that provides broad exposure to multiple disciplines and ways of knowing. Other than the nursing major, some aspects of liberal arts study will be provided as discrete parts of the full educational curriculum; However, the rich and diverse perspectives and knowledge embedded in the liberal arts and sciences will be integrated throughout the nursing curriculum, as these perspectives are integral to the full spectrum of professional nursing practice.

Program Enrollment and Admission

The program enrollment and admission process occur when the following steps have been completed.

1. Complete the online application at <https://apply.olivetcollege.edu/apply/>
2. Submit transcripts from all college or universities attended.
3. Complete the FAFSA (FREE APPLICATION FOR FEDERAL STUDENT AID), if using financial aid or receiving scholarship funding
4. Admission is pending official transcripts of all colleges sent to the admission advisor.
5. The plan for paying tuition must be articulated with the Student Service Department.
6. After official transcripts have been received and transcribed, the student will receive a credit acceptance memorandum (CAM)
7. Students will receive an official acceptance letter from the Director of Nursing Education
8. After these processes have been completed, the Registrar will be notified to enroll students in their first semester courses.
9. Students will receive an e-mail from Information Services and the Director of Distant Learning that includes student's username and password for MyOlivet, Blackboard, and E-mail. The e-mail will also include information about the online orientation course (at no cost to the student) designed to assist students to be successful with using the technology required for the RN-BSN Program.

If there are more students meeting admission requirements than available seats in the courses, the date in which student submitted all their admission documents will be used for selection. Students who are not admitted in their desired start semester will be offered a seat in the following semester start. Olivet College is committed to serving every student that meets the program admission criteria.

RN-BSN Program

The RN-BSN program admits students in the summer, fall, and spring. The part-time plan of study is designed to be completed in 24 to 36 months. Should a student step out of sequence (i.e., not attend every semester according to the schedule or drop courses), the time to completion of the degree will be delayed. RN-BSN courses are sequenced; and not every course is offered each semester. Students must complete the RN-BSN program in no more than 6 years. When a student changes their academic plan, they must submit a new academic plan document for approval from the director of nursing education.

Computer Requirements

This program is delivered online through the Olivet College Blackboard Learning Management system. Blackboard works best when using Google Chrome. Students will be expected to complete assignments that will require Microsoft Office. All Microsoft Office products are provided to students as part of your Outlook e-mail package and can also be accessed through Blackboard. In addition to having the following capabilities, students need access to Wi-Fi that will allow for timely completion of course work.

Note: Students should be able to perform basic computing tasks, such as performing internet searches, uploading, and downloading documents and using email. Students should also have a basic level of proficiency using Microsoft Word, PowerPoint, and Excel.

Olivet College Portal

MyOlivet found at www.myolivet.edu is the Olivet College portal. Students will receive an e-mail from itshelp@olivetcollege.edu with your 'one sign-on' via e-mail with instructions for creating a new password. The username and newly created password will give student's access to MyOlivet, Blackboard, and Outlook.

MyOlivet has many features that students will need to use to be successful in the program. First, students will need access to their financial aid information and financial aid award letter. Prior to the first day of courses, students will need to accept their financial aid award. Another feature is class registration. Students will be auto-enrolled the first semester and then will be responsible for registering for courses during the open drop/add period found of the academic calendar in MyOlivet. Students will find a link to the online bookstore, OC (Olivet College) online library services, Blackboard, and campus e-mail.

Blackboard Learning Management System

Students can access Blackboard through MyOlivet. A list of courses that the student is registered for can be found there. Orientation to the Blackboard course is provided each semester via a video.

Academic Credit from Associate Degree

Graduates of community college associate degree and diploma programs may be awarded up to 90 transfer credit on a course-by-course basis in accordance with Olivet College policies.

Olivet College BSN Graduation Requirements

As is typical of bachelor's degree programs in the U.S (United States)., the Olivet College RN-BSN Program requires the completion of 120 semester hour credits. Liberal arts requirements are embedded in the nursing courses and program. As is the case with other institutions, a minimum of 30 credits must be earned at Olivet College to be awarded a bachelor's degree from the college.

The 120 total credits required for the BSN degree are earned through a combination of the following:

- Upper-division nursing courses including required liberal arts criteria courses (35 credits)
- Credits transferred from the ADN-granting institution or other colleges attended (90 credits)
- “Flexible credits” that may be earned in a variety of ways (20 credits)

Total credits required for BSN degree – 120

Didactic Courses

Didactic courses are courses ending in either a “0” or a “5”. These courses are taught exclusively through Blackboard. In a typical didactic course, a student can expect to complete a discussion forum every two weeks and an assignment every other week. There is also a cumulative project due at the end of the semester for each course. There are two didactic courses that are usually taken with a practicum course (NUR 411 and NUR 441).

Practicum/Service-Learning Guidelines

According to the American Association of Colleges of Nursing (AACN, 2012): nursing is a practice discipline that includes both direct and indirect care activities that impact health outcomes. Practice experiences are embedded in baccalaureate nursing programs to prepare students to care for a variety of patients across the lifespan and across the continuum of care. Practice experiences refer to experiential learning in any setting where health care is delivered, or health is influenced that allow for and require the student to integrate new practice related knowledge and skills. Practice experiences include activities that support health and/or provide care, interacting with a variety of providers and/or with patients and cannot be completed solely by a student in isolation. “Patients” are defined as individuals, families, groups, communities, or populations.

Practice experiences to transition the nursing student’s competencies to the baccalaureate level of proficiency include organization/systems understanding, leadership development, evidence-based practice, information management and integration of technologies into practice, inter-professional collaboration and communication, clinical prevention and population health, comprehensive assessment, and quality improvement strategies. Didactic and practice experiences should be provided to all baccalaureate students, including those in RN to BSN programs, for the student to achieve these expected skills and knowledge and to integrate them into one’s practice.

Practicum courses are courses ending in “1”. These courses are delivered through Blackboard. In a typical practicum course, the student can expect to spend 45 hours with a preceptor. Each practicum course requires that students complete five (5) journals addressing the progress towards the student's goals articulated in the first journal, complete a mid-term (Week 7) and final self-evaluation (Week 14), and complete a service-learning project deliverable to the practicum site and uploaded into Blackboard.

Practicum Health and Safety Compliance

Practicum sites require that colleges and universities track and store evidence that students meet health and safety guidelines. Information uploaded in the CastleBranch compliance tracker may be shared with the practicum agency. Olivet College and our contracted practicum sites make reasonable and safe accommodations for identified limitations. Students who do not have all required documents uploaded in CastleBranch at least 10 days prior to the practicum course start date will not be eligible to participate in the practicum course.

CastleBranch is a compliance tracking organization that the program partners with to assure that students meet the health and safety requirements to complete practicums with our contracted practicum sites. CastleBranch is a FERPA (Family Education Rights and Privacy Act) and HIPPA compliant organization that has the following fees that students will need to pay to CastleBranch:

- \$35 Multi-Year Compliance Tracker
- \$103.50 Background Check
- \$42.00 Urine Drug Test
- \$15.00 HIPPA e-learning (if needed)
- \$15.00 OSHA e-learning (if needed)

At the beginning of the first nursing course (NUR 305), the student will be asked to create an account with the programs health and safety management system CastleBranch and upload the following items:

- A current Registered Nurse license.

Provide documentation of current Professional License or verification of licensure through the state website.

- Students who do not hold a Registered Nurse license must present verification of the license within 3 months of beginning the program.
- Nursing students who passed all full-time first year ADN (Associate Degree Nursing) courses with a grade of "C" or better and who submit a letter of recommendation are eligible to apply to enroll in any courses noted in the academic catalog as "Open to approved ADN students." These students are eligible to apply for regular admission to the RN-BSN Program after successful completion of the NCLEX (National Council Licensure Examination). When these students apply for regular admission, they will be required to comply with the health and safety requirements but are encouraged to begin the process when taking NUR 305.

- Satisfactorily complete a criminal background check via CastleBranch (\$103.50)
- 10-panel drug test via CastleBranch (\$42.00)

At least 10 prior to the start of NUR 411 and NUR 440, the student is required to upload the following items in CastleBranch:

- Documentation of American Heart Association Healthcare Provider CPR Certification
 - Must be American Heart Association Healthcare Provider course. Must be front and back of card OR eCard. Card must be signed; eCard does not need signature. Renewal date will be set for expiration date on certification.
- Documentation of Health Insurance
 - Provide a copy of your current health insurance OR proof of coverage. Students who have changes in their health insurance should resubmit a copy of their current insurance OR proof of coverage within 30 days.
- Documentation of Physical Examination
 - Upload documentation of your completed physical examination. The form must be completed and signed by a medical professional. Document must state any limitations or state “no limitations”.
- Documentation of Professional Liability
 - Provide documentation of current Professional Liability insurance coverage with a minimal coverage level of \$1,000,000.
- Documentation of Influenza Vaccine
 - Submit documentation of flu shot administered during the current flu season (September-March). Renewal September 1 annually.
- Documentation of Varicella
 - 2 vaccines OR positive antibody titer. Non-immune follow-up action Single booster and repeat titer.
- Documentation of Measles, Mumps, & Rubella
 - MMR combined (1) Requirement (2 vaccines or positive antibody titer; non-immune follow-up: single booster and positive titer) OR Individualized (3) requirements.
- Documentation of Tetanus
 - Full Tdap (Td or Tetanus not accepted) within 10 years. Renewals 10 years from Tdap administration.
- Documentation of Hepatitis B OR Signed Declination
 - 3 vaccines OR a positive antibody titer. Non-immune follow-up: single booster and repeat titer.

Documentation of Tuberculosis (TB)

Negative two-step test OR Negative QuantiFERON Gold Blood Test. Accepted positive evidence: Physician clearance documented on letterhead following positive results.
Renewal Negative one-step test OR Negative QuantiFERON Gold Blood Test.

Documentation of COVID-19: Immunization may be required depending upon practicum site.

Students who received Pfizer and Moderna must demonstrate completion of both doses. Students who receive the Janssen Vaccine should demonstrate the one immunization received. A positive antibody titer; non-immune follow-up: vaccination of choice and repeat titer OR declination in writing with student signature. Students who decline the COVID-19 vaccine must record this in writing.

Documentation of HIPPA Certification

Completed RN-BSN Program Practicum MOU (Memorandum of Understanding)

MOU is not needed if the student is completing their practicum at Bronson Health or Oaklawn Hospital (and affiliates). All areas must be completed on the document.

RN-BSN Program Preceptor Agreement

All areas must be completed, and the 4 questions must be answered with the 4th question being answered "yes".

RN-BSN Program Student Agreement and Release of Liability

All areas must be completed.

Course Enrollment

As part of the admission process, your academic faculty advisor will assist you with any scheduling needs throughout your program including individual course enrollment. The program courses are offered in a sequence and all courses may not be offered every semester. Students who wish to either speed up or slow down course sequencing must work with their advisor to complete an academic plan to ensure that you are on track with graduation requirements prior to the beginning of each semester.

In NUR 305 students will be asked to complete an academic plan. This academic plan will be forwarded to the Assistant Dean for Academic Records. At any time that a student's academic plan changes, the student must submit a new academic plan. Periodically there are program revisions that may make sense for students to move to the revised curriculum. In this situation students are required to complete a Major/Minor Declaration Form. These documents can be found in MyOlivet or by contacting the student's service specialist or director of nursing education.

Textbooks

A list of required textbooks will be available at least two weeks prior to the first day of classes. It is always appreciated when students use the Olivet College Online Bookstore (link below), however; students may purchase textbooks at any location. Be aware, some courses may require students to use the electronic resources assigned to the text by an authorization number within the text. In these cases, it is important to assure that there is an inactivated code within the text.

Library Resources

Kellogg Community College (KCC) supplies Olivet College RN-BSN Program students with a desktop username and password to access and use KCC library resources on and off campus. Students may also use the on-campus library for learning materials (texts, periodicals, etc.) by visiting the library and presenting a picture identification. Students have online access to KCC's electronic library.

Student Support Services

The Olivet College Nursing Program Office is at KCC in the C-Building room C105. The Student Service Specialist and Director of Nursing Education is equipped to assist students with admissions, registration, financial aid, and other general questions about Olivet College and/or the Nursing Program. Olivet College support services are also available to nursing program students via virtual connection. Faculty and the Director of Nursing Education are also available virtually and by appointment at KCC or OC. Please contact Barbara McCalley at 269-719-0167 for assistance. Student Tutoring Services

Olivet College offers tutoring services through the Academic Accommodation Coordinator and online tutoring services. Students who identify a need for a tutor should first work with their faculty to assist with meeting their needs. All faculty are required to have office hours and should be a student's first contact for additional help in a course. The director of nursing education is also available to assist students with understanding course materials.

Orientation Activities

All students will be enrolled in an online orientation course that will introduce Olivet College and the Blackboard learning management system. On the first day of each course the instructor will provide an orientation to the individual course.

Communication

Communication between students and faculty is critical. All communication should be conducted through Olivet College e-mail. Students must check their Olivet College e-mail every 48 hours to assure that they are receiving the most up-to-date information. Students can expect that faculty will respond to e-mails within 48 hours Monday through Friday and respond to e-mails sent over the weekend by 5:00 pm the following Tuesday. It is recommended that students forward their Olivet College e-mails to their personal e-mail account.

Faculty often share their cell phone numbers with students in the event of an urgent need. The director of nursing education is available for emergencies 24 /7 at (269)832-3591. Phone calls and text should be limited to urgent and emergent needs. Faculty have been directed to redirected student to their e-mail accounts for communication when phone / text messages are deemed non-urgent.

Guidelines for Written Assignments

American Psychological Association (APA) guidelines are used for all written work by students. All undergraduate students must use the APA style for written assignments in nursing courses. The *Publication Manual of the American Psychological Association* (7th ed.) is available through the Olivet College Bookstore.

The following items are to be written using APA format as needed in papers: title page, margins, spacing, alignment, title, headings, paragraph indentation, pagination (page numbering), abbreviations, numerals, citations, quotations, and references.

Plagiarism

Plagiarism is the presentation of someone else's ideas or work as one's own. Students must give credit for any information that is not either the result of their original research or common knowledge. If a student borrows ideas or information from another author, he/she/they must acknowledge the author in the body of the text and on the reference page. Students found plagiarizing are subject to the penalties outlined in the Policies and Procedures section of the Olivet College Academic Catalog, which may include a failing grade for the work in question or for the entire course. Blackboard has plagiarism SafeAssign software that examines all submitted work for plagiarism.

Evaluations

Course Evaluation

At the conclusion of each course, students are provided the opportunity to evaluate the course and faculty. Student evaluations contribute to the overall evaluation of the faculty and curriculum.

Program Evaluation

Periodically throughout the program students will receive a survey to evaluate the current program and / or provide input in making program changes. In the final course of the program students will receive a program evaluation survey. This survey is used to assure that the program continues to meet student's needs.

Agency and Preceptor Evaluations

All Olivet College nursing students are required to complete an evaluation of their practicum experiences. The evaluation will be completed at the end of each practicum course and submitted to the course instructor.

Courses and Syllabus

Every course has a syllabus which is the contract between the faculty and the student. Syllabi do include the language that the syllabus may be changed to assure that students are meeting the course competencies.
